


Year 2 – Home School Learning

<p>Watch this video about performance poetry by the famous author, Michael Rosen.</p> <p>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=RvV23xoZRkI</p> <p>Now, select your favourite poem to perform to your family, using these tips.</p> <p>(See the attached poetry pack)</p>	<h3><u>Money</u></h3> <p>Find 1 each of all the different coins and notes (if you have them). Can you name them? Place them in order from smallest to largest. If you can draw around them to show their size and colour them correctly.</p> <p>Challenge: Add up all the coins and notes. How much money do you have in total?</p>	<p>This week we are learning about VE day.</p> <p>Why is VE day so important? Children can use websites or speak to older relatives to learn more about it. Find out what happened in the local area on VE day. How would this be different today and why? Discuss.</p>	<p>This week we are becoming artists</p> <p>Research artists:</p> <p>You could look in books at home, around your home or online. Maybe ask an adult or sibling at home what their favourite artwork is.</p> <p>Once you have found some paintings or drawing you like, look carefully at them. How does the artist paint? Using dots, large paint strokes, water colour, oil or pastels?</p> <p>Make some notes to use later this week.</p>
<p>Create a mind-map of all of the features you identified when reading the poems. I.e.</p> 	<h3><u>Money</u></h3> <p>Using the coins you found yesterday, how many different ways can you make 56p?</p> <p>Challenge: What is the smallest number of coins you could use to make 86p?</p>	<p>Comparing war time to what we are experiencing now (pandemic,) are there any similarities and differences? You could present your findings in a table.</p>	<p>Now you have found some artwork you enjoy choose one piece to use as your inspiration.</p> <p>Have a go at copying the work, look at the paint strokes and the colours used. Experiment with your work.</p>

<p>Which poem do you like the best?</p> <p>Write a short paragraph to explain why it is your favourite.</p> <p>Now draw an image of what the poem means to you.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Money</u></p> <p>Set up a shop in your house. What type of shop will you have? Find some items you can sell and label each one with a price. Don't forget to add your pounds and pence symbols. Ask your family to buy 1 or more items and help them to work out the coins they need to pay for them.</p> <p>Challenge: Set some challenges for your family. E.g. How much will it cost to buy an apple, an orange and a banana? How much would 2 apples and 1 banana cost?</p>	<p>Imagine that you are being evacuated. What would you pack? Draw and label essential items and then design a luggage label.</p>	<p>Use what you have learnt about art this week to create your own new piece of work in the style of the artwork you studied yesterday.</p> <p>Maybe you could create a series of pictures and display them for your family or to share online.</p>
